A huge thank you to all of the parents/whanau who attended the Meet the Teacher Evening. We loved meeting with you or reconnecting our relationship with you again. This was a wonderful opportunity to talk with you about your child/tamariki and their learning and development at Kelvin Road School.

A big thank you to all parents who filled out and returned our Meet the Teacher Survey we had a wonderful **70**% response. It was pleasing to see that parents/whanau voted and prioritised the **2019 Learning Goals** for the **2019 Charter** as follows;

- 1. To have good relationships with the child's teacher **100%**
- 2. i = To improve through professional development teachers knowledge and skills in writing and mathematics **99**%
  - ii = To deliver a balanced and relatable curriculum to your child 99%
  - iii = To improve the use of digital learning tools 99%
- 3. Improve through professional knowledge and understanding of the cultural Background and significance of your child **97**%

We asked you which format of Meet the Teacher you preferred. 2019 – in the hall with time to meet the teacher or 2018 – children performing and informal gathering. The preference was for the 2019 format rather than 2018. With 34 votes for 2018 and 116 for 2019.

#### Solutions for absence or late issues (School starts at 8.30am)

To help support parents/caregivers with getting their children to school on a regular basis we have listed below some common problems with solutions. We will send our letters to help encourage whanau to ensure children get to school on time

to solicor on time	
PROBLEMS	SOLUTIONS
Uniform dirty/wet	Send child to school in mufti and we can provide a uniform for the day which they return before they go home.
No lunch	School can provide lunches as a stop gap measure, ie sandwiches, muesli bars, fruit. If this is an ongoing problem we can also provide help through our Social Worker in School.
No breakfast	We are lucky enough to have volunteers who run a breakfast club 5 days a week from 8:00 am - 8:30 am. Everyone is welcome to come along for some weetbix.
Raining	The school provides raincoats through Kidscan to help children dry on the way to school Another way to help is to put your child's uniform in a plastic bag in their school bag and when they get to school they can get dry and changed back into their uniform.
No one home in time to pick up child from school	SKIDS provides an after school care programme. They also offer WINZ subsidies. Their contact details are 09-265-2422 or 021-300-146
